Minister's Message: Reverend Tracy Robertson

I have to admit that my favourite month of the year is October, but I'm biased, of course, because my birthday happens to be in October. It seems that I wanted it that way from inside the womb because I was, in fact, due in Mid-November but came early....in a snowstorm. No really, it's true!

Despite it being the Halloween month, I have never been very good at wearing masks. I wear my heart on my sleeve and my emotions are very close to the surface. It used to bother me A LOT when tears came with every emotion. Sad tears, frustrated tears, surprised tears, happy tears, and the ultimate worst: angry tears. All I wanted was to be able to express myself using my words instead of crying! Especially when I was angry, couldn't I just tell someone off without crying!. People thought I was overly emotional, but I've realized that my emotions are who I am and trying to suppress them was trying to be someone I wasn't. There was a year where I tried to bury my emotions so that they would stop getting in the way of my taking care of others, and to some extent that worked. I was able to shelve my emotions until a more appropriate time came to let them out. That has been helpful for sure. Not letting my emotions have their time kept me from being my authentic self. I tried to force myself to wear a mask; to change who I was at my core, which resulted in my not being my best.

We often receive strong suggestions to wear masks to be accepted or to fit in or to know our place. If doing so holds us back from being our best selves, then stop doing it. I realized that suppressing my emotions was one thing in those moments I wanted and needed to be present to others, but not allowing myself to visit those suppressed ...

emotions later was detrimental to my well being. I'm the kind of person who needs to acknowledge and honour those emotions to continue to be at my best. I am emotional and won't hide behind any masks or pretend not to be; and I have learned to embrace my emotional self and be proud and grateful for who God made me to be.

Have fun this Halloween and every other time really, because wearing a costume and playing a part is a great way to let our inner child and geek out. It helps us to remember to be playful and not to take life too seriously. If your masks and disguises are not honouring who you are and you're asked to hide your true self, then I'm telling you to take them off. You are precious and worthy and valued just as you are and being your best self means you are there for others because you're know your own value. Discipleship is servanthood. Learning from Jesus is learning to serve others, and we can only do that well when we're at our best. Calgary Alliance for the Common Good – Discernment Assembly

It was an amazing Discernment Assembly on September 16 with over 160 people attending! The people in attendance from St. Thomas voted as a group on which of the four issues we thought were the most important to our congregation. All four campaigns were very close with the amount of support they received. The two campaigns that had the most people committed to be on the Research Action Teams were Good Jobs and Mental Health. It was decided that Affordable Housing campaign would have a group that worked with other organizations to support them in their work and inform the Alliance of any actions that need the help of our membership. The people interested in the Environment work of the Alliance will work with the Climate Hub and Alberta Environment Network, which are both member organizations with the Alliance. The CACG has also committed to having Truth and Reconciliation be a part of all the work we do.

The Alliance had a rally for the Green Line at City Hall on September 16 with over 100 people attending and broad media coverage. Going forward we will keep a close eye on the decisions that are made by the City and Province to ensure support for the best possible outcome for the people of Calgary.

REPORT FROM TREASURER - GREG HYATT

Operating Fund

Operating Fund donations year-to-date to August 31 are down about \$6,000 or 3% versus the comparable period last year. They are down by a similar amount versus total donations for the comparable period in 2019 – the last full year before the pandemic. The result is that, on an inflation-adjusted basis, 2024 Operating Fund donations significantly lag our donations five years ago.

Year-to-date facility usage income, on the other hand, is up \$9,000 from the comparable period last year. This is due to a combination of new third-party users of our facility, a key user no longer benefiting from pandemic-related discounts, and inflation adjustments.

Operating Expenses year-to-date are up about \$10,000 from the comparable period last year. This is due primarily to a combination of United Church-mandated inflationary salary increases for our ministers and increased snow-clearing costs due to last winter's heavy snowfalls.

We had budgeted for a \$13,000 Operating Fund deficit for 2024. I am currently projecting a full year Operating Fund deficit of between \$5,000 and \$10,000.

We have been fully staffed throughout both 2023 and 2024. Reverend Marion joined us (as well as Foothills United Church on a 50/50 shared basis) on October 1, 2022, while we added a part-time Marketing & Communications Coordinator in Autumn 2022 and a part-time Sunday School Coordinator in January 2023. The primary focus of these two part-time positions is on the growth of our congregation, which is so important for the long-term viability of St. Thomas.

Why is growth of our congregation so important? We are all getting older. We've had some significant donors pass away or relocate to other communities, while retirement and other factors has led to reduced financial capacity for others. To offset this, we need to have new families joining our congregation. We are starting to see this happen with the increase in the number of children at Sunday services versus a few years ago. As we move forward to 2025 and beyond, we expect to be financially challenged in generating sufficient Operating Fund revenues to cover this Fund's expenses. With inflation having moderated significantly, our growth in expenses should moderate accordingly. However, our total annual donations continue to be challenged by the factors noted above. Our congregation's continuing growth is paramount to our continued financial viability.

Building and Memorial Funds

We currently have \$160,000 in our Building Fund and Memorial Fund combined to pay for capital costs and major repairs. With our facility now 35 years old, these reserves are very necessary. To illustrate, we used \$20,000 from the Building Fund to replace the upstairs carpets this summer and would like to replace the sanctuary's carpets next summer. Our Building & Property Committee budgets carefully for expenditures from these funds. However, potential unplanned expenses, such as being unable to secure replacement parts for our 20+ year old furnaces and having to suddenly replace them with modern, energy-efficient furnaces, could draw these funds down substantially.

In closing, I would like to extend my sincere thanks to all of you who continue to generously contribute to St. Thomas throughout these very challenging times.

And don't forget to purchase your grocery gift cards! That is our biggest fundraiser, and we all need groceries – why not have St. Thomas benefit from the significant discounts at which we buy these cards?
