# Treasurers Report – Greg Hyatt

## Operating Fund

Operating Fund donations year-to-date to August 31, 2025, are up about \$12,000 versus the comparable period last year. This increase is primarily due to two factors: donations from a few families having been contributed in a lump sum early in the year as opposed to monthly; and a couple of significant one-time additional donations.

Year-to-date facility usage income is up by approximately \$8,500 versus the comparable period last year, primarily due to increased usage by the Muslim prayer group.

Operating Expenses year-to-date are up about \$10,500 versus the comparable period last year. This is due primarily to salary and benefit costs being up by about \$9,500 due to inflationary increases in both salaries and benefit program costs.

Our Operating Fund expenses to August 31, 2025, have exceeded our Operating Fund revenues by \$1,700, which is more favourable by about \$10,000 than for the comparable period last year. This improvement in the deficit position is primarily due to the net impact of the factors noted above.

We had budgeted for a \$12,000 Operating Fund deficit for 2025. I am currently projecting a small Operating Fund surplus for the full year 2025.

As we move forward to 2026 and beyond, we expect to be financially challenged in generating sufficient Operating Fund revenues to cover this Fund's expenses. We are all getting older. We've had some significant donors pass away or relocate to other communities, and going forward we will continue to experience this. With our total annual donations in future being challenged by our demographics, growth in our congregation is paramount to our continued financial viability.

### **Building and Memorial Funds**

We started 2025 with \$166,000 in our Building and Memorial Funds combined. These Funds are available for capital costs and major repairs. They are very necessary given that our facility is now over 35 years old. Our sanctuary refurbishment this summer, new carpets and chairs, repainting the walls and refinishing the ceiling, has reduced the combined balance in these Funds by \$70,000. While this project was in progress, we identified a major, long-term water damage issue with significant structural implications. In addressing this issue, we provided for effective rainwater/snowmelt drainage, including a retaining wall. We encourage you to walk outside behind the sanctuary to check it out! Total costs for addressing this water issue, including the drainage and retaining wall solution, were \$40,000 After these expenditures, we currently have about \$75,000 remaining in the Building and Memorial Funds combined. The fact that we had reserve funds that could cover the unexpected \$40,000 cost to permanently address our water issues is a testament to the importance of maintaining such reserves.

### Closing Remarks

In closing, I would like to extend my sincere thanks to all of you who continue to generously contribute to St. Thomas throughout these very challenging times. And don't forget to purchase your grocery gift cards! This is our biggest fundraiser and we all need groceries. Why not have St. Thomas benefit from the significant discounts at which we buy these cards?

### Commitment - Maureen Dodd

Commitment seems like an easy and noble virtue to demonstrate, until it's the day before the newsletter deadline and the Muse has not appeared. Then it feels like commitment is a good virtue for other people to have, and the suggestion to let Copilot assist me in my writing becomes tempting.

I like to think of myself as a committed person: committed to my family, my church, my volunteer work, meeting the newsletter deadline, but then I compare myself to really committed people, like Noah, for example. He didn't decide just to build a small boat and take along a couple of kittens and goats. He was truly inclusive. And what about Mrs. Noah? October 24, 2025: Messy Church at St. Thomas - A night that's fun for the whole family. There will be fun activities and stories shared. Senior High stay late afterwards.




## Other Opportunities for Soloists and Instrumentalists



# Building and Property - David Blackadar

I'm happy to report that repairs to the exterior back wall of the sanctuary where the leak occurred this summer have now been completed. Mitigation work was also done to protect the back wall and foundation from water damage in the future.

The repair included excavation of the soil to a level below the elevation of the concrete pad to facilitate the construction of a retaining wall and installation of two French drains, one inside and one outside of the retaining wall. Two buried drainage pipes were then installed to carry rain and melt water to the western flowerbed adjacent to Hawkwood Boulevard.

The repaired wall was restucced to match the building. Three corners of the building, where the stucco had been worn away, potentially allowing the ingress of water, were also sealed and restucced.
