Minister's Message: Reverend Tracy

Marj Aucoin and I visited Harold and Tess Ashley on Orange Shirt Day, September 30, 2025, and every person we came into contact with gave us compliments on our bright, orange shirts. It was humbling to have support for what the orange shirts represent and the work of reconciliation we continue to do as we evolve as caring and compassionate children of God.

During that visit, I was reminded that I haven't kept up with my morning devotion of reading Richard Rohr's Centre for Contemplation email that lands in my inbox faithfully every day. After a month of reading and taking in this renewed spiritual practice, it's given me pause and challenges me every day to keep stretching and growing my spirituality if I am to remain relevant in the world.

The words that have resonated with me this past month include the need for both priest and prophet. Priests to keep the tradition (popular) and prophet to challenge tradition (unpopular). The other is the fact that we have no choice as to the tradition we're born into; however, that doesn't mean we have to settle for that tradition as we grow, mature, and critically think.

The daily reminders nurture me while giving me a reset that allows me to wonder about how and why I'm doing things the way I'm doing them. Is whatever "it" is life-giving, death-dealing, or a mix of both? If the tradition is life-giving, then it is my joy to live it out as priest. If it's death-dealing, can it be salvageable? If not, and I continue to participate in it, I'm participating in that same harm. Out of those traditions that refuse to evolve and get better, there is opportunity for new spiritual traditions to be born. I just need the courage to be the prophet and challenge.

St. Thomas continues to be community within a living tradition that deserves to expand and change as we expand and change. God encourages us to help make that happen for good while still celebrating all that our tradition has given us. Tradition, like us, has growing edges. It's exciting to dream of new dreams and it's comforting to do so within the traditions we hold so dear.

Thank you to Harold Ashley for being my contemplative partner this last month. May we continue to share long into the future.

Here's how it plays out in our house: I make lists, plan ahead, make more lists, pack, attempt to finish all the "to do" things before we leave, make our third list, finally pack trying to anticipate every possible weather phenomenon, and then close the front door. Phew! Now for some well deserved holiday time. We are sure we have prepared for any eventuality. Wrong! Here's some of the very memorable glitches.

2001-09-11: We were scheduled to fly home from Houston, Texas that day. Wondered why the weather channel kept talking about planes being rerouted into Chicago. This is before we were comfortable carrying cell phones, so our family at home were frantically trying to contact us. We ended up staying in Houston for a week before being able to secure an Air Canada flight home. The Americans, amidst their grief, treated us very well. Fascinating to be in the USA during this time.

Houseboat Holiday: Years ago we owned a houseboat timeshare. We invited two sets of Stan's cousins to join us for a week on the beautiful Shuswap Lake. I organized all the food, sent them lists of what to bring, and off we went. We stopped in Canmore for lunch. I had this niggling in my brain that something was wrong. Had I received confirmation that this particular week was the correct week? I couldn't remember. So, I phoned, these were the days when real people answered business phones. And NO, OUR WEEK STARTED THE FOLLOWING SUNDAY! How do I tell these cousins that we had to return home, unpack, and start again next week. But I did, and the cousins said, well, OK, see you next week! And they did, and it was grand.

We have taken wrong turns, stayed at amazing hotels and resorts, stayed at dismal motels, forgotten credit cards, forgotten medications, had items stolen, missed planes, and taken the wrong train going the wrong way. But we survived and LOVE to remember these glitches. Funny, the trips that were almost perfect are forgettable.

However we are always delighted to return home to this amazing country, our family, and our friends. It's exciting to connect again with our St. Thomas community. Clearly, God has taken charge of many of our outings. Hope your travels are safe, fun, imperfect, and blessed.

Travel Stories - Ruthann Watson

Bathrooms say a lot about a culture. Away from home, this most basic and common aspect of human existence takes on immense importance and can have significant ramifications, adding hours to journeys and decreasing time spent with the tour guide.

When I was very young, Eaton's and The Bay had lounges adjacent to the Ladies Rooms appointed with comfortable armchairs, where female shoppers could meet and even (gasp) have a cigarette. Smaller stores saw no reason to provide conveniences, even for paying customers, the most desperate, often being directed to a cubby behind the mop and bucket. Service stations with clean accessible washrooms were almost unknown, especially for women, again, the grubby little corner room with the cleaning supplies.

Parks Canada administrators assumed that an outhouse every few hundred meters was sufficient for the outdoorsy types. Rural church boards evidently viewed toilets as drains on funds and square footage.

The advent of travel for the common people has strained ancient infrastructure to the limit. Purchasing a few trinkets does not offset the cost of re-plumbing castles or World Heritage sites. Bush toilets and squatty potties don't mesh well with aging travelers from western countries, and we're not used to paying for convenience, or toilet paper. And the whole issue of facilities for the homeless is seemingly unresolvable, especially when complicated with drug use and safety issues.

I'm sure we all have recited the Dua, a Muslim prayer of gratitude for bodily health:

"All praise is to Allah, Who has removed discomfort from me and granted me relief".

In this season of Thanksgiving, may we be thankful for the luxury of facilities.

Travel Misadventures - Maureen Dodd

Many of our travel misadventures (ie: first-world problems) share the theme of 'lost.' Lost in translation, lost in a warren of medieval streets, lost in the countryside, lost on a train, lost in an airport. Although we didn't have to wander for forty years, like Moses and his crew, it sure felt like we had at the time.

My worst lost in translation moments actually came in English-speaking countries. On the first day that we moved to Texas, our one-year-old was getting fretful and hungry, so we asked the very Texan real estate agent where we could eat. She replied, "Well bless his little heart, I'm fixin' to go right across the street there to that buffet. All y'all can pitch to your wind, so everyone will be happy." (Pitch to your wind is Texan for all-you-can-eat.) Why are other culture's idioms so perplexing?

My first attempt to purchase train tickets in England was terrifying. I had two toddlers with me so asked for three tickets to London. The agent said 'Single?' Um – no – there are three of us. He said again 'Single ticket?' and I counted us up and said, Nope, there are still three of us. Finally, an exasperated man in the line (queue) behind me shouted "he means a one-way ticket." Oh. Who knew English is such a hard language?

We were lost in the Frankfurt airport with Pat and Stu Robbins. We had a connecting flight to Venice but it had taken so long to get through Customs that we were frantically scurrying down several halls before finding the correct one. We had no boarding passes for the next flight, as a whimsical agent in Calgary said we could get them in Frankfurt. Pat and Stu had their boarding passes, and Stu was able to convince Security to let us all through. We got to our gate as the door was closing. Then I left my purse on the plane when we landed in Venice. And our luggage never arrived. Two days without eyeliner; that is a true travel hardship. But we were grateful that none of us collapsed from all the sprinting.

We were lost several times walking the Camino de Santiago, when we missed the shells marking the trail. It seemed like every time we had to retrace our steps, we had to go uphill. That must be some kind of life metaphor.

The commonality in all these adventures was that we always found someone willing to help. No matter what language any of us spoke, smiling, pointing, and drawing maps on the back of boarding passes were universal symbols of kindness. Except, of course for the finger-pointing between spouses as we assigned blame for the situations.

I try to keep Sydney Carter's hymn in mind on any journey: Give me courage when the world is rough; keep me loving though the world is tough.

May you find kindness and show kindness in all your journeys.

What is Happening this Month?

Here are the events we currently have planned for November.

Sundays

November 2, 2025 - Movember: To kick off the month we will be discussing the significance of 'Movember' in its relation to men's health, both mental and physical.

November 9, 2025 - Remembrance Day: As our Sunday closest to Remembrance Day we will take this day to pay respect to both the fallen and our veterans.

November 16, 2025 - Peace in the World: Unfortunately despite best intentions following the conclusion of WWI and WWII our world is not yet at peace. We will use this Sunday to acknowledge ongoing wars in our world and discuss potential opportunities with respect to capacity and possibility to take part in creating a more peaceful future.

November 23, 2025 - Hanging of the Greens: At St. Thomas we will join the rest of the congregation in the service to celebrate 'Hanging the Greens'. At both churches, it will be an intergenerational service.

November 30, 2025 - Advent, Hope: This Sunday will mark the official start of Advent; a time of year where we discuss the lead up to the birth of Jesus Christ.

Fridays:

November 7, 2025 - Ice-Skating: For our first Friday of the month join us for an offsite activity: ice skating. We will be ice skating in the Olympic Oval at the University of Calgary. Admission will be around \$5.00 per youth. Youth are encouraged to bring their own equipment, however equipment can be rented for a little over \$7.00. If affordability is a concern, please ask for assistance. We would love to have you there, do not let money prevent you from taking part.


